I was able to find a company that supplies the cords and I was able to find a colored cord that is close to "Interact blue". The cords cost \$6 each BUT there are some pretty significant discounts for bulk purchases (the cost drops to \$3.75 when you order 100 and to \$3.50 when you order 300). Is there any interest in doing a bulk purchase for those Interact Clubs whose school districts permit the wearing of cords at graduation?














The Rotary year ends on June 30, so it's time to start to think about the Rotary District 7305 Interact Club(s) of the Year.

The Our Lady of Sacred Heart (OLSH) Interact Club participated in their rescheduled "MLK Day of Service" which was canceled in January due to snow. Martin Luther King Jr. Day is the only federal holiday designated as a national day of service, where individuals are encouraged to volunteer to improve their community. The group decided to spend the day at the Mooncrest Neighborhood Program (MNP). located just four miles from OLSH. MNP serves persons in the community experiencing the effects of poverty and promotes "spiritual, intellectual, physical, social and emotional development for children and families living in the Mooncrest neighborhood."

The all-day visit to Mooncrest began with a delivery of items like cereal and nutrition drinks from the school's food pantry. The next few hours were spent doing spring cleaning tasks throughout the center. Surfaces, furniture, walls, and windows all received a thorough scrubbing from the Interactors.

After learning about the many free resources and services available at the center, students participated in two weekly adult programs with the Mooncrest residents - the Faith Sharing group and Pokeno! The afternoon was spent finishing up some much-needed tasks, such as relocating some shelving, organizing books, and shoveling the sidewalks. The drive through the community on the way back to campus was somewhat somber, as students saw the many small units which sometimes house more than one family due to the increasing cost of rent. "The students left feeling more grateful for the

many blessings in their own lives, and with the desire to return to do more good," said Interact Moderator Cheryl Karashin. "They reflected on how they are aware that the needs throughout the world are vast, as they shared their surprise at the level of need so close to home."

The group hopes to schedule a regular opportunity to perform service at the MNP After School Program, which takes place daily and serves upwards of 70 community students in grades K-8. The Club would like to engage some members of the OLSH Spanish Club to help with communication and ESL tutoring, and Mrs. Karashin is hoping to get other faculty members involved as well.

I would like to say it has been an absolute pleasure partnering with you and your schools to fundraise for ShelterBox as they support evacuees from Ukraine.

We had 12 schools participate: Greensburg Salem, Our Lady of the Sacred Heart, Bethel Park, South Fayette, Latrobe, Norwin, Albert Gallatin, Uniontown, Portage, Laurel Highlands, Chartiers Valley, and Montour. Through our joint efforts, we sold over 1,000 shirts! While I do not know the exact total we will receive to donate, my estimate is over \$7000, which is so exciting.
