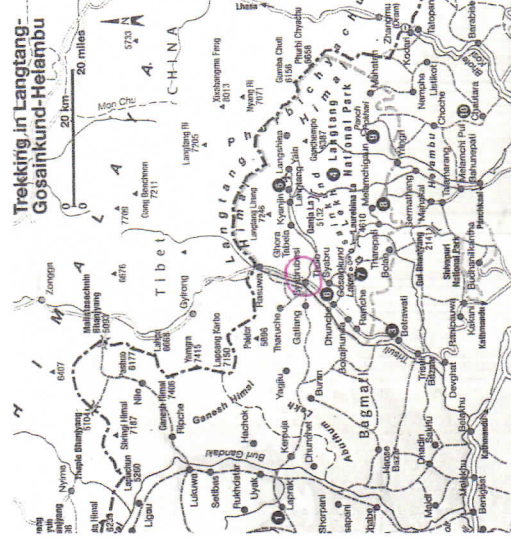


The 7.8 magnitude earthquake that devastated Nepal on April 25, 2015 destroyed large portions of the capital Kathmandu. It was totally devastating to impoverished Nepalese/Tibetan villages close to the Chinese border whom are among the most disenfranchised in this poor rural nation.



Bridim, Nepal

Bridim is a beautiful mountain village in the Langtang National Park valley north of Kathmandu. It is inhabited by 1600 Tamang and Tibet origin people and is rich in natural and cultural heritage. Every structure was levelled including the community center and monastery. Many of these were guest houses for those trekking to see 8000 meter peaks in the Himalayas.



Four Sunriver Rotarians are joining a work party Nov.1-15, 2015 with people from Portland and Germany. We are paying 100% of our travel and accommodations so all funds raised will go to village needs. The goal is to build 43 personal structures using earthquake resistant engineering that is compliant with the national park standards. Each home is estimated to cost \$1000. The first rebuilding project will be the community center which will be a training model so that local villagers can learn the earthquake safe design.
